Ixcán Ministries entered a new season of leadership in January 2000, when our president and co-founder, Marlane Peterson, died due to cancer. Our then treasurer assumed that role, but when she faced a serious illness, I was named board president in October 2021. Subsequently, the past seven months ushered in some new faces to serve on our U.S. board of directors.

Running a mission takes a village. I discovered that truth early on after arriving to Santiago Ixcán in 1998. Immersed in a totally different culture and way of life, I had to rely heavily upon the people for my basic welfare. I realized that a woman living alone in a remote area isn't the ideal mission model, but God called. Over the years, my solitary life with the people bonded us as nothing else could and they became my primary community.

As the ministry grew and took shape, God brought two people, Javier Gonzalez and Carmen Jimenez, to help me run the mission. Javier is our on-site co-administrator who, along with me, coordinates and supervises our projects. In addition, he maintains the mission house and grounds. Carmen accompanies me in my pastoral work with various women's groups as well as leads and advises when needed. Both are faith-filled, exceedingly smart, honest and wise. Without formal degrees and titles, they excel in their areas of expertise. Javier has strong administrative gifts with an innate aptitude for numbers and accounting. Carmen is intuitive, and often acts as our eyes and ears. She doesn't read or write but understands and speaks three Mayan languages. They complement my gifts and limitations.

In addition to Javier and Carmen, we formed local leadership committees around our educational and some of our outreach projects. This shared leadership, with oversight from Javier and myself, has enabled our projects to function and flourish, even when I am not physically in the village.
