In the background, I saw the opened door of their house and could almost smell the new boards of its walls nailed together.




In this time of the coronavirus pandemic, like most other places in the world, Guatemala's president issued a mandate throughout the country called, "toque de queda" a touch of stay – where the people were asked to stay at home. Alicia, her little sister Mayli, her mother Tona, and her grandmother did so in their new house.

It is the house that generosity and love recently built through our outreach ministry.

Guatemala, like most of the world, remains closed to travel and certain services are suspended. Schools, restaurants, churches are closed. Grocery stores and banks remain open, but only on specific days and during shortened hours. In Santiago Ixcán, restrictions tightened even further when a young man brought the virus into our village after working in Playa Grande where he contracted the illness. In this time of 'shut-down' our ministries, too, are affected.

Early in the ministry, I saw the need for local leadership to help me run things. I formed committees to help guide and manage our scholarship, library, and women's Ixcán Creations micro-business projects. Also, Ixcán Ministries hired trusted and wise Javier Gonzalez to oversee and co-administer with me these projects and help manage our outreach of food, emergency medical, and housing assistance for those in need. We asked compassionate Carmen Jimenez to step in to provide counsel and prayer with our women's *luchadora* (abandoned mothers with children) group. Things are still running but differently through the on-site committees, Javier, Carmen, and me via the telephone.

Our library is open two days a week for lending books on a one- by- one basis, and librarian, Rolando, sends coloring pages for the children to do at home. The scholarship committee reviews those students who continue to study on-line to receive scholarship benefits. The outreach ministry through Javier and Carmen attend to the needs as they arise, including material assistance to build another house for a struggling young family. Carmen meets now with the *luchadoras*, individually for prayer and counsel.

Because of the pandemic-caused unemployment and lockdown, besides our work in the Ixcán, we are expanding our reach in a short-term, small, hidden ministry in Guatemala City for those who now find themselves hungry.

We learned that people on the curbsides, and from doors and windows, began waving a white flag as a sign of desperate hunger. So, we explored the possibility of helping just a few and implemented 'the white flag' ministry through two trusted young men from our village who are working in the Capital. For now, it is one of the small things that we can do with love for the poorest of the poor.



And finally, it is with a saddened heart I share the news that we recently lost one of our most trusted and self-giving friends from the village, Antonia Villatoro, who died on June 30th of complications of a surgery performed in Coban. Antonia served on our leadership committees for the women's Ixcán Creations jewelry cooperative and our scholarship outreach. We will greatly miss her.
